Perceptions of HIV selfscreening

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BACKGROUND

- In 2016, South Africa had 270 000 new HIV infections
 - 7.1 million people living with HIV accounting for 19% globally¹
- HIV self-screening kit has been pre-qualified by WHO as a:
 - Recommended strategy to increase access to HIV testing²
- 90-90-90 goal: 90% of HIV infected people know their status

AIM

The study explored the perceptions of HIV self-screening for healthcare workers and participants that accepted or refused an HIV self-screening kit




METHODS










RESULTS: Refusals





RESULTS: Health Care Workers



45.5% (10/22)

Better than traditional, but with some concerns

54.6% (12/22) Would Recommend



PARTICIPANT'S PERCEPTIONS

"I don't trust new things." – <u>Participant (refused</u> <u>the kit)</u>

"I have mixed feeling about people who test at home they do not have counselling but then they can do it privately"
<u>healthcare worker</u>

"I did not understand how to use it, I forgot the instructions"-Participant(did not use the kit)

"It's different, okay and nice compared to the normal one"
<u>Participant (used the kit)</u>

"I do not believe tests that do not use bloods." — <u>Participant (refused</u> the kit)



CONCLUSION

- HIV self-screening: acceptable to participants and the healthcare workers
 - Due the convenience and privacy, with many indicating that they would recommend it
- Some concerns: misinterpretation of results and lack of counselling
- Solution: Increase awareness and education on HIV self-screening
